Dear Mr. George:

This letter serves as an interim response to your May 22, 2025 Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request to the Social Security Administration (SSA) for the following information from February 15, 2025 through the date of the search:

- 1. Records reflecting the legal conclusions reached by the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and SSA regarding the authorization and legality of adding living individuals to the Death Master File (DMF).
- 2. All records through which DHS communicated the living individuals it requested be added to the DMF. This would include the emails, spreadsheets, or data files sent to SSA for the purpose of adding living people to the DMF.

Your FOIA request pertains to SSA's April 2025 action that resulted in certain aliens being added to SSA's death records. Please note that, in early June 2025, the agency updated its records so this population would no longer appear as deceased in agency records.

The redacted records responsive to item #2 of your request are publicly available online in our electronic FOIA Reading Room at https://www.ssa.gov/foia/readingroom.html. Under the Proactive Disclosures (Current Year) heading, view the records entitled: DHS Email to ACOSS - DHS parole terminations for SSA_Redacted and DHS Secretary Noem Email with Memos to ACOSS Redacted.

Our response to requested item #1 will be issued upon completion of our search and review of record(s) responsive to item #1 of your request.


Protecting Our Country from Suspected Terrorists

Social security numbers are the central administrative unit in our country. Having a social security number enables an individual to open a bank account, get a credit card, and file for government benefits. These are privileges that encourage people to remain in the country. Giving these privileges to suspected terrorists without lawful immigration status incentivizes these dangerous individuals to stay in the United States rather than return to their home countries.

This troubling set of incentives raises national security concerns. Millions of individuals without lawful status—including suspected terrorists—remain in the country, fully integrated into society. Yet the President has declared that "[i]t is the policy of the United States to faithfully execute the immigration laws against all inadmissible and removable aliens, particularly those aliens who threaten the safety or security of the American people." Protecting the American People Against Invasion § 2 (Jan. 20, 2025). The President has further directed agencies to "adopt policies and procedures to encourage aliens unlawfully in the United States to voluntarily depart as soon as possible." Id. § 12.

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) seeks the Social Security Administration's (SSA) assistance in correcting this perverse set of incentives and ridding the country of individuals who threaten national security. DHS requests that SSA take all measures consistent with law to prevent suspected terrorists who are here illegally from using social security numbers to obtain the privileges reserved for those with lawful status, including but not limited to access to financial institutions, state government agencies, credit bureaus, employers, and any other institutions that use social security numbers for verification. DHS will collaborate with you on this project, providing the necessary immigration information and any other assistance that you may require.
